

## Modified Rail Quilt, Teen

Theme Print Blocks – 1 yard x 42/44", cut into six – 5 ½" wide strips

Border – 5/8 yard x 42/44", cut into five – 3 ½" wide strips [piece long sides using the 5<sup>th</sup> strip]

Rail 1 accent color A – ½ yard, cut into six – 2 ½" strips

Rail 2 accent color B – ½ yard, cut into six – 2 ½" strips

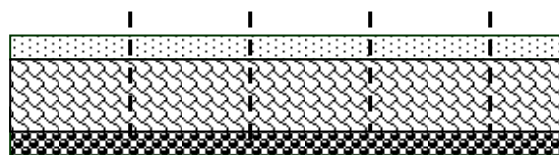
Backing – 1 ½ yards – 44" x 62"

Batting – 44" x 62"

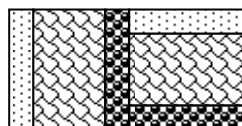
Step 1: Using ¼" seams throughout construction, sew one strip of color A to a theme print strip. Then sew a color B strip to the opposite edge of the theme print strip. Repeat process for all sets of strips. Press seams to one side. Sets should now be 9 ½" x width of fabric.

**Step 2:**

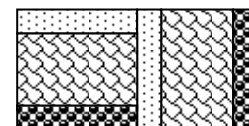
Cut each set into 9 ½" squares.



Row 1, 3, 5:



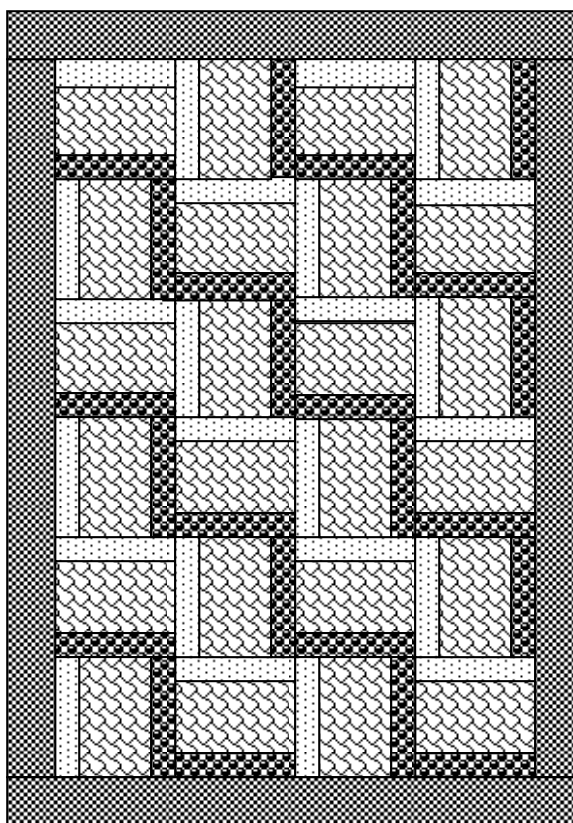
Row 2, 4, 6:

**Step 3:**

Sew the 9 ½" blocks together, alternating the direction of each blocks, as shown, into 6 rows. Press to 1 side.

Sew the 6 rows together. Press, using ease of construction.

Step 4: Piece and add side borders, press and trim. Add top and bottom borders, press and trim.



Finished size is approximately 42" x 60".

This blanket can be finished using the traditional method, which uses a binding, or the 'envelope' method, which uses no binding. Quilt or tie at least every 3 ½ to 4 inches. Quilting on the diagonal at all intersections looks nice and reinforces the blanket. Quilting ½" around the outside edges gives a more finished look when using the 'envelope' method.
