We Love Our *Needle*-wielding Volunteers

Thinking back to my childhood, there was no sound that said “all is right with the world” quite like the sound of my mother’s knitting needles going clickety-click, clickety-click. And nothing could match the softness and warmth of her treasures when they were finished.

With so much doting on our quilting volunteers, it is long overdue to say a special thank you to all of you who knit and crochet beautiful, soft, cuddly blankets for our kids.

One such volunteer is Helen Green of Sun Lakes. Helen moved to Arizona from Oklahoma City in 1979. She had raised her four children and was seeking some community involvement. She learned of AZB4K from Betty Manovsky of the Agave Quilters in Sun Lakes.

Helen immediately set to work crocheting blankets for our agencies. She contributes at least 50 afghans a year! Her favorite pattern is a simple double crochet, changing yarn colors to create a pretty striped afghan. Her blankets are approximately 40” wide and 40” to 50” long, perfect for our child/toddler size. We

love all knitted and crocheted blanket donations (except preemies). And blankets with a tight knit stitch will withstand the strongest wrapping, cuddling and squishing that our kids are bound to give them.

Helen also has 8 grandchildren and just as many great-grandchildren clamoring for her lovely afghans. Thanks so much for treating our AZ kids like part of the family!

With all the finesse in the clickety-click, knit one pearl two and yarn-over, it will have your grandchildren saying, “You mean you can do all that but you can’t play my Game Boy!!”



Fresh Air and Friends Amid the *Needles*

Once again the fresh scent of the needles welcomed our volunteers back to Camp Emmanuel Pines in Prescott. On August 18th, 29 campers converged on their quilting cabin. Their getaway lasted through the 20th at the low price of \$125 per person. Kittie and Natalie, of Cutting Edge Quiltworks, continued as our gracious hosts. Through their planning and generosity, campers enjoyed project demonstrations, "strip" poker, meals, lodging, and a sewing room made for socializing.

Campers were invited to spend their time in any way they wished. There was no strict agenda. They could bring UFOs (unfinished objects), handwork, crocheting, knitting, ipods (see Courtney's ear below) or simply a good book to read in the cooler temperatures.

AZB4K provided quilt kits for anyone who wished to work on them and it must have been a popular option. Over 100 preemie quilts were completed in 3 short days. An additional 24

quilts were completed in various other sizes. A dozen toddler size tops were added to this impressive list. Kittie kindly volunteered to finish them for our kids.

There were trips to the local quilt shops on Saturday afternoon, but the night belonged to the high rollers... rollers of fabric, that is. Over a dozen ladies belled up to the betting table for a lively evening of "strip" poker. Texas Hold'em was their game and 2 1/2" strips of rolled fabric was their currency. Campers ranged in age from 23 to 74. The fun to be had at this camp shows no age discrimination. However, there was some playful teasing of the young'uns with ipods in their ears. There were two mother daughter couples; Ellie Gill and daughter Joy Osterberg as well as Susan Quisenberry and daughter Courtney Quisenberry.

The volunteers at Las Palmas Grand need no needling, prodding or goading to turn out hundreds of blankets each year (over 1,000 last year). On June 24th they hosted a Bee in their Ballroom. This venue is always a favorite. We love it for its extensive elbow room, natural light, and let's not forget our favorite chefs... Tim and Joe. Thanks again for the tasty lunch and all your time throughout the year keeping our quilters fueled up with food on their Bee days.

Although it was the middle of Summer, when many of our volunteers seek refuge from the sweltering heat, this Bee was very well attended. There were 51 volunteers in attendance turning out 76 blankets by the end of the day. An amazing 412 blankets were donated at the door and kept our distribution volunteers sorting and packing at a steady pace.

During the bee we had the pleasure of meeting a new volunteer. Marissa Ciaramitaro is a young lady attending Fremont Junior High School in Mesa. She presented AZB4K with a donation of eleven preemie blankets, five child-sized blankets and a knitted blanket.

This motivated youth gave of her time and talents as part of her Summer Service Learning Project. She is the President of the Service Club and spent time visiting each station at the Bee. She paid close attention to each task and looked for opportunities to offer assistance from her Service Club. We hope to see more of Marissa and her classmates in the future.



Desert Club Donation

Once again we send heartfelt gratitude to the Desert Club. This non-profit women's service organization provides scholastic scholarships to students living in the East Valley and community grants to non-profit organizations serving women and children.

Desert Club, founded in 1946, currently has 38 active members and 112 "life" and "sustaining" members. Since 1958, Desert Club has hosted the annual Christmas Idea House where over the course of four days, events are held at one or more beautifully decorated luxury homes. All of the proceeds from these events go to scholarships and community programs.
