## Checkerboard Center Quilt, Version 1, Child

This kit contains 20 squares of color A fabric, 20 squares of color B fabric, 4 narrow strips for the inner border and 4 wide strips of theme fabric for the outer border.

Outer border $-11 / 8$ yards theme print fabric, cut into four $-81 / 2^{\prime \prime}$ wide strips Inner border $-1 / 3$ yard, cut into four $-21 / 2^{\prime \prime}$ wide strips
Checkerboard $-1 / 2$ yd. of color $A$, cut three $-41 / 2^{\prime \prime}$ wide strips into $20-41 / 2^{\prime \prime} \times 41 / 2^{\prime \prime}$ squares
$1 / 2$ yd. of color $B$, cut three $-41 / 2^{\prime \prime}$ wide strips into $20-41 / 2^{\prime \prime} \times 41 / 2^{\prime \prime}$ squares
Backing - 1 1⁄2 yards [54" x width]
Batting - 42" $\times 54$ "
Use a $1 / 4$ " seam throughout construction. To make the checkerboard center, sew the squares together in rows of 5 squares across. Row A starts and ends with a color A fabric square and Row B starts and ends with a color B square. You will have 4 of each row type.

Row B


Sew the rows together starting with Row $A$ and alternating the rows and ending with Row $B$. This forms the checkerboard center as shown.

Sew the narrow inner border strips to the center checkerboard, starting on the long sides of the rectangle. Press and trim. Add wide border strips, sides first, then top and bottom. Press and trim.

Finished quilt is approximately 40 " $\times 52$ ".


This blanket can be finished using the traditional method, which uses a binding, or the 'envelope' method, which uses no binding. Quilt or tie at least every $31 / 2$ to 4 inches. Quilting in the ditch looks nice and reinforces the blanket. Quilting $1 / 2$ " around the outside edges gives a more finished look when using the 'envelope' method.
