The raffle quilt was presented to Will on April 8 at a meeting of the American Legion Auxiliary Post 320 in Rapid City, So. Dakota. Approximately 25 people were in

attendance, including Will's parents and grandparents. His grandmother, Jane Merchen, presented the quilt. He was thrilled! He admired the quilt for its beauty, craftsmanship, and especially the patriotic design. He plans to hang the quilt in his home where he and his wife can enjoy it and keep it safe from the sticky fingers of their two small children.

Blanket Guidelines

We have developed the following blanket guidelines based on feedback from our recipient agencies.

Materials

100% cotton fabrics in child-friendly patterns and colors. For knitted or crocheted blankets, please use washable acrylic yarns.

Construction

All blankets should be machine quilted or tied every four to six inches with a square knot (except Premies). These blankets are well-used and need to be durable and washable. If tied, agencies request that we use pearl cotton or embroidery thread as opposed to yarn.

Sizes

Premies 16" x 16" to 18" x 18" Blankets must have flannel backing, no batting and minimal quilting. Either stitch from corner to corner in an X or stitch 2" from edges on all four sides. *Do not tie.*

Infant 36" x 36" or larger

Toddler 36" by 44" (one yard of fabric)

Child 36" by 44" or larger

Teens 40" x 60" or larger

We often receive requests for more blankets suitable for boys or in gender neutral colors and patterns, particularly in the Teen size. Thank you for keeping our teenaged recipients in mind!

Agency Spotlight: Williams Community School

Williams Community School, formerly East Valley School, opened in 1990 as the valley's first alternative high school to serve at-risk youth. Five years later, it expanded to include alternative junior high students, and in 1999 the elementary school opened to help meet the needs of children from homeless and transitional families. Day care and pre-school programs are also available to enable teen parents to complete their education.

Many of its students, because of their transitional lifestyles, move frequently. The advantage of Williams Community School is that the children of homeless families do not have to change schools as their families move around the East Valley. The school provides transportation, medical & dental assistance, clothing and food for its homeless families thanks to donations, volunteers and community outreach programs.
